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The Bible is a composed of 66 books that are divided into two covenants, the Old Covenant and the New Covenant.

- The Old Covenant: 39 books
- The New Covenant: 27 books

OLD COVENANT

- Begins with Creation
- Speaks of God's people (Jewish people) up until 400 years before the time of Christ
- Written by roughly 28 different authors
- Covers a time period of over two thousand years

NEW COVENANT

- Begins with the birth of Christ
- Speaks of the life of Christ and the ministry of His disciples
- Written by nine different authors
- Covers a time period of less than 100 years

CREATION

 The creation of the world and man, and early events.

PATRIARCHS

 The birth of the Hebrew people through a family of patriarchs, covering a period of two hundred years.

EXODUS

 The exodus of the Hebrew people as they are delivered out of four hundred years of slavery in Egypt.

WANDERINGS

 A "new generation" of Hebrew people wander in the wilderness for 40 years, one year for every day the spies spied out the Promise Land.

CONQUEST

 The conquest of the Promise Land by the Hebrew people upon their return from Egypt.

JUDGES

 A four-hundred-year period during which Israel is governed by rulers called judges.

KINGDOM

 An additional fourhundred-year period during which Israel becomes a full-fledged nation ruled by a monarchy.

EXILE

 A seventy-year period during which Israel's leaders live in exile, having been conquered by foreign countries (Israel by Assyria & Judah by Babylon).

RETURN

 The return of exiled Jews to Jerusalem to rebuild the city and the temple.

SILENCE

 A final four-hundred year period between the close of the Old Testament and the opening of the New Testament.



Purposes of The Mosaic Law

- 1. Revelatory: Revealed the holiness of God and sinfulness of man
- 2. Regulatory: Served as a guide for how a redeemed people were to relate to God and man

Parts of The Mosaic Law

- Moral: Ten Commandments (Exodus 20)
- 2. Civil: Diet, sanitation, taxation, marriage, military service, etc. (Exodus 21-34)
- 3. Ceremonial: Seven Levitical Festivals & Five Levitical offerings (Exodus 35-40)

Nature of the Law

12 "So then, the Law is holy, and the commandment is holy and righteous and good." (Romans 7:12)

16 "But if I do the very thing I do not want to do, I agree with athe Law, confessing that the Law is good." (Romans 7:16)

8 "But we know that athe Law is good, if one uses it lawfully . . ." (1 Timothy 1:8)


